Our motto, *It's Great to be a Lion "We Serve,"* has been taken to a whole new level in Austin. On June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2011, Lion Harold Mattfeld will be honored for 70 years of service to Lionism. Lion Harold first joined the Lions in 1941 and has been a member of the Austin Lions since 1950.

Lion Harold is a young 99-year old who still makes every Thursday noon meeting and who still actively participates in the annual Lions Pancake Day project and helps out at the Lions concession stand at sporting events. His dedication to Lions has earned him the Lion of the Year Award in 2007 and was named a Melvin Jones Fellow in June 2010.

Lion Harold was a New Year's Day baby, born in 1912 in Fort Dodge, Iowa. After high school he joined the Army-Air Force and became a flight instructor in World War II. He helped win the war by teaching all those boys to fly. In 1950 Harold moved to Austin to start the Austin Cashway Lumber business, which he owned and operated until his retirement in 1977.

Lion Harold has outlived his spouse and has two daughters who both live in Connecticut. His hobbies include golf, tennis, jet skiing, flying, and an occasional Manhattan with extra cherry juice. The Austin Lions will be honoring Lion Harold again this January when this very special Lion celebrates his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday.

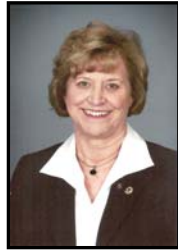

## Getting There

The School of Instruction was a success, and the presenters did a great job. I heard many good comments about it. It would be nice to see more Lions attend next year.



On May 21<sup>st</sup> Vern and I attended the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Lions Diabetes Research Update at the University of Minnesota's Center for Magnetic Resonance Research. Two islet cell transplant patients shared their experience living with diabetes and how being cured of the disease has changed their lives. Dr. Bernhard Hering provided an update on his current pre-clinical trial that is one step away from anticipated FDA approval to transplant pig islets into humans to cure their diabetes. We toured the most powerful imaging magnets in the world where scientists can, in real time and non-invasively, view inside the body. The tour allowed Lions to see how their investment in the magnetic resonance islet-imaging laboratory is being used. As Dr. Hering says, "At some point in the hopefully not-too-distant future, people with diabetes will have better options available to them."

Vern and I are looking forward to attending the international convention in Seattle the first week in July.

# Camp Winnebago News

We are counting down to the best time of the year at Camp Winnebago — summer camp! Staff will be arriving soon from surrounding college campuses and all other corners of the world. Just like the Lions, we are international and celebrate this diversity as an added dimension to the overall camp experience.

One of the incidental outcomes of camp is the leadership training and cultural exchange that our young staff members gain during what most will describe as “the best summer of my life!” Of the 43 summer staff (seasonal program and support staff), 13 have previously worked for Camp Winnebago and are returning; another four worked for me in Florida; and two are siblings/friends of past staff members. We will also benefit this summer from volunteers who worked with me, had to “grow up” and seek a “real job” year-round, but can’t leave the magic of camp behind just yet. David will travel at his own expense from New Zealand to spend six weeks of his “vacation” volunteering with no compensation besides his own personal satisfaction of this experience. Ben plans to travel from Florida for 1-2 weeks for the same reason.

If this year follows the trend of past years, I suspect as we near the start of our summer sessions, we will hear from more of our past team members wishing to do the same. Most would find it difficult to understand why these young adults choose to spend 16+ hour days working while getting paid less than minimum wage in actual salary. Nor would most eighteen to twenty-something year olds handle the tasks of helping others with personal care that includes changing diapers, toileting, feeding and more complicated issues like tube feedings, special medical care and behavioral management. It is not something I can even adequately explain in words. However, just bring on the campers, build a campfire (complete with s’mores, of course), belt out the traditional camp songs at the top of your lungs, and you have just a taste of what you will

crave more of. Add the satisfaction of watching a camper try new things and master them through opportunities that are not always readily available to a population faced with everyday challenges of a variety of disabilities and the joy of making new friends daily - now you have a few more ingredients toward a great summer. The best part is that those of us in the know cannot wait to share this with anyone and everyone else. We welcome any “spice” you can add through volunteering or just visiting us from June 6<sup>th</sup> - August 5<sup>th</sup>, and I guarantee you will not regret the time spent at Camp Winnebago. So please consider sharing your time and talent to help us create the most memorable Summer Camp 2011!

# You Are Invited to Camp Needle Point

The American Diabetes Association, Minnesota Area, is currently planning our two largest programs of the year: **Camp Needlepoint/Daypoint** and our **Diabetes Expo**. I personally want to invite you to visit one or both of these programs this year. As Lions clubs, I would like you to see how your dollars are being put to work.

Camp Needlepoint sessions are Sunday, August 14, to Saturday, August 20; and Sunday, August 21, to Saturday, August 27. Since registration and camper pick-up are scheduled for the Sundays and Saturdays, we ask that you schedule a day during the week. The time at camp will include a tour of the camp facility, lunch with the campers, and an opportunity to meet the medical staff, counselors, and campers. Camp is located just south of Hudson, Wisconsin. Contact Chris Schaefer at 1-888-342-2383, ext. 6592, or by email at [cschaefer@diabetes.org](mailto:cschaefer@diabetes.org) to schedule your club's visit. We ask that you not show up without first contacting us, as we need to know who is on-site for the safety of the campers and staff.

Our Diabetes Expo will be held on Saturday, October 15<sup>th</sup>, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM at the Minneapolis Convention Center. It is billed as "everything you need to know about diabetes under one roof," including workshops, cooking and fitness demonstrations, free health screenings, an "Ask the Expert" area, and vendors offering the latest diabetes products and services. Last year over 5,500 people attended, and we're expecting more this year. Lions can get involved in several ways:

- We invite you as a 5M Lion to come to learn more about diabetes.
- We need many day-of-event volunteers for this activity. Lions clubs may want to volunteer as a club. Many clubs helped last year and, by wearing their vests, gained more recognition for Lions clubs. Volunteer for a few hours (time slots are 8:15 AM – 12:00 PM, or 11:30 AM – 3:15 PM) or for the entire day. Please contact me at 1-800-676-4065, ext. 6592, or at [cschaefer@diabetes.org](mailto:cschaefer@diabetes.org) if you or a club would like to volunteer.

- Several areas outside of the Twin Cities worked on organizing buses to and from the Expo for members of their community. Clubs from several communities in your district could set up a bus route with several stops to pick up people. Work with your local clinics, hospitals, churches, etc., to get the word out. All people will have free admission to the Expo and there will be free bus parking at the Minneapolis Convention Center.
